Outrigger Enterprises Breaks Ground On Waikiki Beach Walk

Outrigger Enterprises, Inc. has broken ground on Waikiki Beach Walk, the \$460 million, 7.9-acre hotel-retail-entertainment redevelopment that will transform the dated Lewers-Kalia-Beach Walk area of Waikiki into a premier leisure destination featuring name-brand hotels, shops and restaurants into a unique Hawaiian-style, pedestrian-friendly setting. The event occurred on the morning of April 1st.

"This is an historic day for Hawaii and for Outrigger," said David Carey, President and Chief Executive Officer of Outrigger Enterprises. "Waikiki Beach Walk represents an excit-

ing new era for Waikiki, one that brings new energy and vitality to one of the world's most beloved tourist destinations."

"Outrigger began in Waikiki more than half a century ago, so it is with deep pride we're launching this exciting new development that helps ensure Waikiki will remain the world's favorite vacation spot for decades to come," Carey added.

Hawaii Governor Linda Lingle and Honolulu City and County Mayor Mufi Hannemann were among numerous dignitaries, government, community and business



leaders who attended the official ground breaking ceremony. The symbolic "ground breaking" was held on the roof top of the OHANA Waikiki Tower hotel, which will be completely renovated and converted

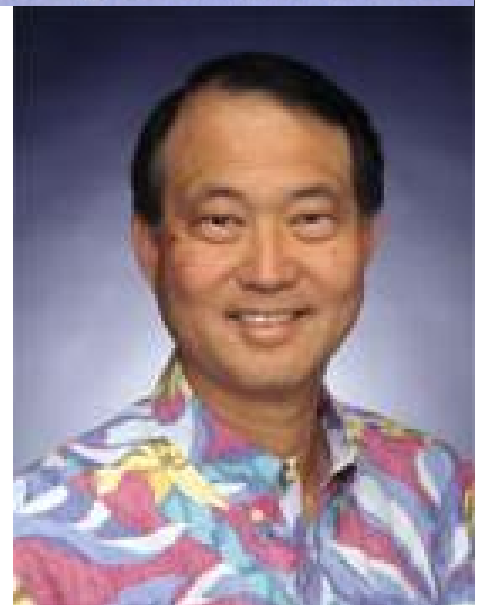

Tracy Nalani'eha Smith (nee Graham) was born in Kapaa, Kauai, where she started dancing hula with a Kauai halau at the age of five. Soon after, she moved to Oahu where her dad was stationed in the Navy. She grew up in Kaimuki and continued to study hula with Magic Hula Studios. During her youth, Nalani studied voice with Hawaii Diva Melveen Leed. Later she studied with Katie Lee. Her current voice coach is Naeva Raego.

This talented ambassador of the Aloha State has appeared in Europe, New York, Las Vegas, Los Angeles and Japan. With an impressive vocal range and a varied dance repertoire that includes hula, Maori, Tahitian, jazz, hip hop, ballroom and tap, she is that rare type of performer that can sing and dance with equal fluency. Notable film appearances include "50 First Dates" with Adam Sandler, and "The Big Bounce" with Morgan Freeman.

Nalani appears weekly at various Honolulu nightspots and even gets down and funky in Waikiki at Moose's as "Planet Jane"! She has also performed in Waikiki's own Magic of Polynesia. Nalani takes



extreme pride in her role as vocal and creative movement coach at Hawaii Performing Arts Academy.

Master Furniture Maker and Hawaiian Quilt Designers Coming to Outrigger Waikiki and Outrigger Reef

Woodworkers and quilters can combine a summer vacation to Hawaii with an opportunity to learn about Hawaiian furniture-making and Hawaiian quilting from some of the islands' foremost masters. The Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach and the Outrigger Reef on the Beach are hosting a series of home-oriented events from May through August, 2005, as part of their ongoing series of Hawaiian cultural and educational guest programs. Most of these events are free and open to the public.

"Defining Home: Native Woods, Western Objects" focuses on Hawaiian furniture-making, and is a collaboration between the Outrigger properties and the Mission Houses Museum on Oahu. From May 20 through August 20, 2005, a unique collection of Hawaiian furniture and furnishings will be on display at the Mission Houses Museum in downtown Honolulu.



The special exhibit tells the story of furniture-making in Hawaii and explores the use of native Hawaiian woods, cross-cultural influences, unique island adaptations, and the evolution of this distinctive craft over time.

In conjunction with the "Defining Home" display, the Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach will be hosting a series

of free presentations by James Ferla, one of the state's most notable experts on fine woodworking and Hawaiian furniture-making. Originally from Connecticut, Ferla began experimenting with wood at the age of 9, and in his career has restored or built hundreds of antiques and heirloom pieces for private owners across the country. Some of his finest work is on display at the Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach including a 20-foot wide koa wood showcase inspired by furniture made for Hawaii's royal family and an extraordinary Navigation Table that highlights the celestial "maps" used by Polynesians to navigate thousands of miles across the open ocean.

Ferla's presentations will take place at the Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach on June 4, July 9 and August 6, 2005, from 11 a.m. to 12 noon. The presentations are free and open to the public.

takes the spotlight at both the Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach and the Outrigger Reef on the Beach in June. From June 10 to 12, 2005, the Outrigger Waikiki on the Beach will display exquisite hand-made quilts honoring Hawaiian monarchs Kamehameha I, King David Kalakaua, Queen Kaahumanu and Queen Liliuokalani; as well as one of the oldest quilts of the Hawaiian flag. Guests staying at the property can receive a complimentary kalo (taro) quilt pattern that was specially designed for the hotel. The display is free and open to the public.

On June 10 and 11, 2005, the Outrigger Reef on the Beach hosts a free exhibition of more than 30 hand-made Hawaiian quilts. In addition, quilters can attend a two-day Hawaiian Quilt Design Workshop led by designer John Serrao of Poakalani

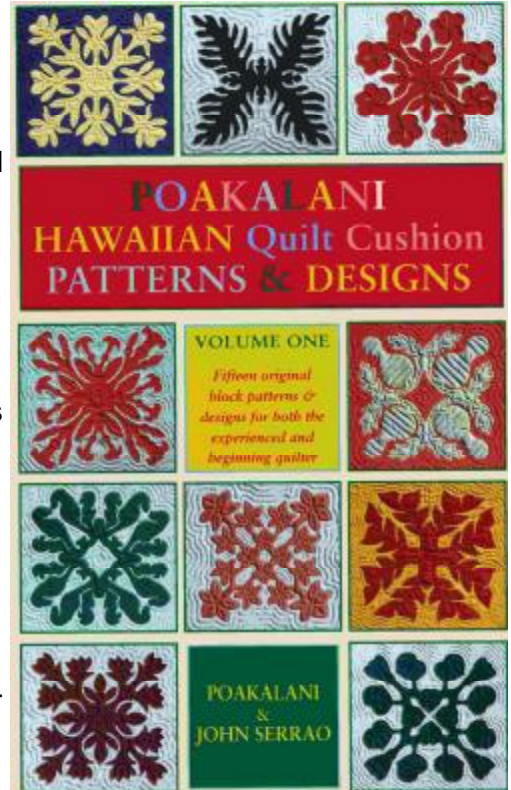
Hawaiian Quilt Designs. Serrao has authored four books and taught numerous classes on Hawaiian quilting, and his company has created more than a thousand quilt designs.

Quilting was introduced to Hawaii from the West, and subsequently evolved into its own unique art form. A full-size bed quilt can take up to 500 hours to complete, and requires 10 stitches per inch to be considered museum-quality.

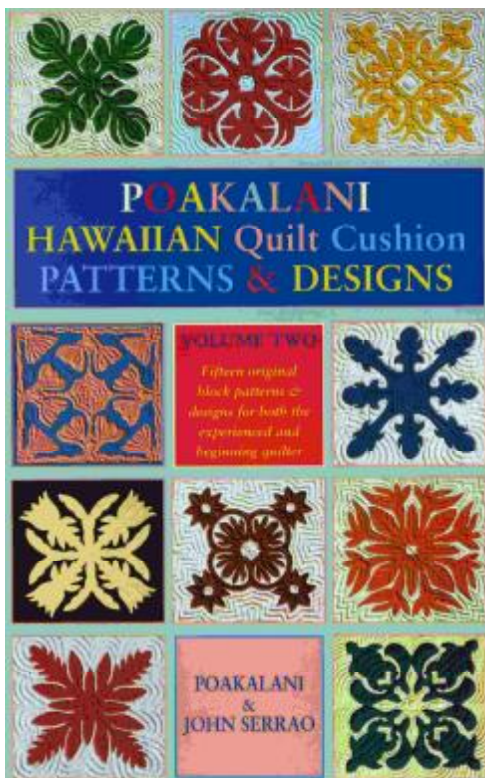

into the Embassy Suites Hotel-Waikiki Beach Walk as part of the new Waikiki Beach Walk project.

Waikiki Beach Walk -- which has been ten years in planning -- will transform an aging, congested area of Waikiki into a "must see" visitor destination center featuring an outdoor entertainment plaza, 40 specialty retailers, four major restaurants and several smaller food and beverage outlets, plus four nationally-recognized hotels. "Waikiki Beach Walk will be an unsurpassed, fully integrated mixed-use Waikiki destination where you can stay, play and experience Hawaii all in one area," explained Carey.

"The Outrigger hotel brand has always been synonymous with world-class service and genuine, Hawaiian-style hospitality. We're proud to bring the Outrigger brand to this innovative development that sets a new standard for excellence in Waikiki," Carey said.

Waikiki Beach Walk's unique architectural style — which celebrates Hawaii's voyaging and ocean heritage — incorporates design elements from the Hawai-

ian outrigger canoe and the sea. Graceful glass canopies suspended over the outdoor plaza take their inspiration from ocean waves; supporting beams are shaped to represent the ama of an outrigger canoe. Water features, tropical plants and flowers, and stone walkways are also incorporated throughout the project, giving it a natural, open-air feeling of Hawaii.

"We wanted every aspect of this project to celebrate our rich island heritage, beginning with the architectural design itself," said Carey. "When visitors and guests enter Waikiki Beach Walk they will experience a truly special place that looks, feels, smells, tastes and sounds like Hawaii," Carey said.

Development plans for all three components of Phase One of Waikiki Beach Walk are now set.

Orlando-based Fairfield Resorts, Inc. — the world's largest vacation ownership company — will totally renovate and convert the 480-room OHANA Reef Towers into a brand new 195-unit vacation ownership resort containing 95 one-bedroom units, 83 two-bedroom units, and 17 two-, three- and four-bedroom Presidential suites. Fairfield Hawaii at Waikiki Beach Walk will be Fairfield's first resort in Waikiki.

Outrigger will completely renovate the existing OHANA Wai-



kiki Village and OHANA Waikiki Tower hotels and reopen them as the upscale Embassy Suites Hotel-Waikiki Beach Walk. Outrigger will continue to own and operate the new 421 all-suite hotel after the conversion of the 844 existing hotel rooms.

The last component of Phase One is the 90,000 square foot entertainment-retail complex being built by a partnership between Outrigger and well-known local developer Dick Gushman. The entertainment-retail complex will capture the essence of Hawaii and feature local flavors and island influences. World-renowned Roy's Restaurant -- whose new Waikiki location will be a significant draw to the area -- and Wolfgang Puck Express have recently been announced as

the first two of six signature restaurants within Waikiki Beach Walk. Additionally, six specialty retailers -- including Whaler's General Store, ABC Stores, Maui Divers, TT&K Hawaiian Shirts, Malibu Shirts and Freaky Tiki Tropical Optical -- have also been named as part of the new center. Additional restaurants and retail tenants will be announced within the next few months.



"Our goal was not only to create new, high-quality jobs with this project, but to create new opportunities for local businesses as well," said Carey. "We're excited to report that the majority of the new tenants are Hawaii-owned and operated businesses."

Phase One construction is slated to begin by mid April and is expected to span 15 to 18

months.

Phase Two involves redevelopment of the block bordered by Saratoga Road, Beach Walk, and Kalia Road. Outrigger remains in the planning phase of this stage of the development — which will affect the OHANA Reef Lanai and OHANA Royal Islander hotels — as it completes its vision for a more beautiful visitor and resident-friendly destination in the heart of Waikiki.

"Over the years, the Lewers Street area has sadly deteriorated. The narrow sidewalks, lined with a concentration of aging hotels and low-end retail establishments, have more in common with fading inner city centers on the mainland than with the fabled Waikiki that people save for years to visit," said Mel Kaneshige, Senior Vice President of Outrigger Enterprises. "Our vision was to transform the existing jumble of storefronts and hotel lobbies into a more human-scale, fully-integrated destination that lets eve-



ryone know that they are indeed in Hawaii," Kaneshige added.

Outrigger has worked to ensure there will be no loss of jobs at the affected hotels. Employees have been allowed to transfer to other Outrigger hotels, or to take early retirement. Vendors and retailers in the area were notified many months in advance in an-



icipation of the redevelopment so they could plan accordingly.

Waikiki Beach Walk builds on Outrigger's deep history in the area. Company founders Roy and Estelle Kelley began a tradition of Hawaiian hospitality more than 50 years ago that is legendary throughout the world today," said Carey. "Waikiki Beach Walk enables us to continue to build on that rich legacy, and to deliver the Outrigger promise of an authentic island vacation experience for our guests," Carey said.

This section of Waikiki Beach contains four distinct areas: Outrigger Canoe Club, Sans Souci, Kapi`olani Park and Queen's Surf. The Outrigger



Canoe Club Beach fronts the Club, which was founded in 1908 to revive surfing and canoe paddling, and promote other sports and activities. Sans Souci (from the French "without care") takes its name from a small hotel that once stood on the grounds now occupied by the Kaimana Beach Hotel. In 1893 the famed Scottish writer Robert Louis Stevenson spent five weeks convalescing at Sans Souci. He praised the hotel for its "lovely scenery, quiet, pure air, clear sea water, good food, and heavenly sunsets..."

Next to San Souci is the War Memorial Natatorium, a monument to the 179 island men who

lost their lives in World War I. This unique athletic facility, with its 100 meter salt-water pool (still the largest in the U.S.), opened in 1927. It has been

partially restored, although the pool is no longer used.

Kapi`olani Park Beach is part of the 100-acre Kapi`olani Regional Park which was dedicated in 1877 by King Kalakaua in honor of his Queen Kapi`olani. The park's main feature was a horse-race track in early years. The U.S. Army used the open ground there as an encampment after the annexation of Hawaii in 1898.

The Queen's Surf was one of the most popular restaurant-nightclubs in



Honolulu during the 1950s and 1960s for both visitors and residents. It was named for the famous surf break off shore. The structure was demolished in 1971 to make room for park improvements.

In ancient times, there were at least two temples or heiau located near the shoreline in this area. One was Kupalaha, at Queen's Surf Beach. It may have functioned in connection with the famed Papa`ena`ena heiau where it is believed the last human sacrifice was made by Kamehameha I in Waikiki. The other was Makahuna near the

foot of Diamond Head, which was dedicated to Kanaloa, the god of the Seas, and was attended to by fishermen and seamen.
