## Aloha Drive Park on Hold



The City has announced that the Aloha Drive Park project is on hold. At the Waikiki Neighborhood

Board meeting on Tuesday, August 9th, Keith Rollman, the Mayor's representative, explained that the park site is needed as a staging area for upcoming construction projects. The Aloha Drive Park site is in close proximity to these upcoming projects. By using it as a staging area, the City will reduce the cost of the projects and the time needed to complete them.

In 2003, the city condemned the vacant 33,000-square-foot



property at Seaside Avenue and Aloha Drive, one block mauka of Kuhio Avenue, for approximately \$2.3 million. The site was also used as a base yard for the recent Kuhio Avenue construction. The park project will likely be on hold for at least two years.

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## World's Longest Hula Line at ResortQuest Hawaii's Honolulu Centennial "Hula on the Beach"




In celebration of the Honolulu Centennial, thousands of hula dancers of all ages, races and levels of expertise will unite to participate in ResortQuest Hawaii's Honolulu Centennial "Hula on the Beach" event on Saturday, August 20, 2005, at 4:30 p.m. At this epic event, hula enthusiasts, visitors and kama'aina will be able to share their aloha for Honolulu as they simultaneously dance their own versions of "I Fell-In-Love With Honolulu" on Waikiki Beach to create the longest ever, continuous hula line in history.

Event organizers have contacted Guinness World Records to have the event officially recognized as a world record attempt, however, no confirmation has yet been received on their official involvement. 
