Kuhio Beach Replenishment Project Delayed by Weather

The Department of Land and Natural Resources (DLNR) will temporarily delay the start of its Kuhio Beach Replenishment Project until south swells and Kona winds forecast for the rest of this week have abated.

"Because of the potential for wind-driven waves from up to 20-plus knot Kona winds, on top of south swells this weekend, we have decided to wait a bit longer for improved conditions," said Peter Young, DLNR chairperson. "We're being safe – we don't want to do anything during adverse conditions that could jeopardize equipment and further delay operations."

"We are ready to go and anticipating calmer condition, hopefully at the beginning of next



week. After consultation with our contractor, American Marine Corporation, they will withdraw their sand pumping barge for now, and return when this weather passes," he said.

On-site preparation began yesterday with closing off part of Kuhio beach for a staging area, and positioning of the barge in water offshore Waikiki. During this process the chain for the barge's anchor broke, and the barge was returned to its home dock to replace the chain.

The barge will return once conditions have improved. Two anchored buoys will remain in place, one in the sand pumping area and one further offshore to which the barge will be anchored. DLNR will request a notice to mariners be issued on the locations of these buoys.

Meanwhile, work will continue this week onshore within the staging area. American Marine will be preparing a sand retention basin to receive the pumped sand and seawater mixture.

If another swell should arise once sand pumping is underway, the contingency plan is to re-anchor the pipeline and pull the barge offshore to wait it out.

DLNR designed the beach nourishment project to maximize the efficiency of a 20 to 30 work day window required to complete the project.

The project is intended to stabilize and increase the size of Kuhio Beach, improve water quality and public safety, and demonstrate state-of-the-art offshore sand pumping technologies for future beach restoration efforts.



Hale Koa Honors Our Heroes With the Gift of Life



In support of our troops fighting in the middle-east the Hale Koa is partnering with the Armed Services Blood Program in a special blood drive on Thursday, November 9, 2006. This event will be held in the Hale Koa's Waikiki Ballroom from 9am – 2pm. The public is welcome! What a great

way to start off the Veteran's Day weekend!

The Armed Services Blood Program (ASPB) is the military's blood program. Their primary mission at Tripler Army Medical Center is to maintain a continuous blood supply for our military ohana in the Hawaiian Islands. While maintaining the supply for our region they must also assist with the blood supply for our military operations in the Mideast.

Currently the ASBP sends over 500 units per week to Iraq. The blood sent to Iraq goes to help our Hawaii National Guard, Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, and Coast Guard. Without this much needed supply many of our men and women who are injured would not survive. Currently injured military personnel are two times more likely to survive today then they would have in Vietnam due to our ability to transfuse blood.

A combat support hospital in Iraq averages over 100 units of blood per day. Since the beginning of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom the military's blood program has transfused over 70.000 units of blood.

Work Intensifies on Microtunneling Pits

Contractors are focusing on the two microtunneling pits that will be used to house a new wastewater pipe under Kaiolu Street and the Ala Wai Canal, replacing the aging pipe that broke last March. Waikiki residents have witnessed a spike in activity at the pit that is being built near the Beachwalk Pump Station just makai of the corner of Kuhio Avenue and Kaiolu Street in Waikiki. Deep holes will be drilled and large steel cylinders lowered into the holes. Reinforced steel reinforcement will put in the cylinders, concrete poured in, and the cylinder molds removed.



These so called "drilled piles" or "drilled shafts" provide lateral support so the ground doesn't collapse when the actual pit is built. Doing this also eliminates the need for conventional and noisy pile



driving. That is a relief to the many Waikiki residents who live nearby.

Contractors also say it lowers the chances of existing and aging pipes breaking due to the vibrations triggered by conventional pile driving. The pipe that broke last March lies very close to the pit.

Contractors are also continuing to jet grout and relocate utilities that are located in the pit area, near the pump station. Some of that work will be conducted around the clock. The City and contractors apologize for the inconvenience. They are using state-of-the-art generators that minimize noise, and are carefully monitoring the project noise emissions.

For now, major work on Kaiolu Street is on hold, as contractors concentrate on both the mauka and makai pits. Jet grouting operations along Kaiolu are not expected until the latter part of November, and they will be limited to daytime due to the proximity of condominiums along that street. That also means previous restrictions for on-street parking will go back into effect then.

Jet grouting on the mauka pit near the Ala Wai School should finish in early November. Then the excavation begins.

Contractors will soon have the microtunneling pits ready and the new wastewater pipe will be tunneled under the canal and Kaiolu Street, going mauka to makai. The pits are large, approximately 35 by 35 feet and 30 feet deep.

All this is part of the second phase of the BWEB project. Phase one has been completed. That included the installation of a temporary bypass pipe in the Ala Wai Canal and setting up seven temporary pumps. Having this bypass system is the safety net needed as contractors work to finish phase two.
