# New Ainahau Monument Dedicated


To the sound of Scottish pipes, the dedication of a plaque and monument marking the site of Princess Kaiulani's famed Ainahau home took place this Thursday evening, August 16, 2007, at a "Garden Gathering and Ho'okupu".

The plaque and monument stands in a small park that is part of the Ainahau Vista Waikiki Project. Ainahau Vista Waikiki is a senior affordable rental project by the Hawai'i Housing Development Corporation (HHDC), a private non-profit organization. HHDC dedicated the park and provided the space for the monument.

Randy Moore, chair of HHDC, and Gary Furuta, the project manager, have supported commemorating the Princess since learning of the site's history. Mitsunaga construction and their architect, Kazu Yato, donated the design and the building of the monument at no cost to the project.

The plaque resulted from the devotion of Kristin Zambucka, the author of a biography of the Princess, and the generosity of her associates, Princess Regina Kawanakoa, Condesa Azria, Nora Meijide Gentry, Bruce McEwan and Ramona Harris. Ms. Zambucka designed the plaque and her associates contributed funds for its making.

The monument and plaque, clearly visible from Ala Wai Boulevard, represent a major new addition to the landscape of Waikiki, honoring its history and culture.

## Beachwalk bypass update: Project closing in on completion (from [www.beachwalkbypass.com](http://www.beachwalkbypass.com), August 9, 2007 update)

Work on the Beachwalk Wastewater Emergency Bypass project is about 80 percent complete. The emergency project began in May 2006, following a major break in a Waikiki wastewater line.

Residents of Kaiolu Street, scene of that break, have seen their street return to normal. There is continuing construction at the makai pit on the corner of Kuhio Avenue and Kaiolu. Workers are building a 20-inch bypass that will serve as an important back-up line.

Providing redundancy is the key to avoid a repeat of what happened in March of 2006 when officials were forced to divert 48 million gallons of wastewater into the Ala Wai Canal following a force main break in the aging line under Kaiolu.

Contractors are also installing concrete walls in the makai pit and are building a fence around the mauka pit, near the Ala Wai Community Gardens and Ala Wai School.

The concrete work in the makai pit will be followed by installation of a catwalk system, ventilation and lighting. Once that work is complete, workers will cover that pit with concrete slabs.

Later this month contractors expect to shut down the Beachwalk Pump Station in order to hook up the 20-inch bypass line to an existing 42-inch wastewater line and one of the two new lines built through a sophisticated microtunneling process.

When they shut down the pump station, they will reactive the emergency pumps and pipes along the Ala Wai Boulevard and use that to pump wastewater out of Waikiki.



Workers have also been checking and servicing the 42-inch line that broke in March 2006 following 40 days of rain.

The new lines each run 1,100 feet under Kaiolu Street and Ala Wai Canal. They are now connected to the Beachwalk Pump Station and are moving wastewater out of Waikiki. They were built inside tunnels that were bored by a state-of-the-art microtunneling operation.

The new underground lines serve as both a key portion of the BWEB project and a portion of the permanent fix to Waikiki's aging sewer infrastructure problem. The city plans to build a permanent underground line connecting the microtunneled lines. It will start at the mauka pit and end at the pump station at Ala Moana Park. That job will be put out to bid and construction is expected to start next year.

The permanent line will eventually replace the temporary line that now sits on the floor of the Ala Wai Canal. Because of the pending work, the city will maintain as a base yard a portion of the city park once used by both Iolani School and Ala Wai School.

The gift – a new voyaging canoe, the Alingano Maisu, built specifically as a "floating school" to pass on an ancient body of navigational knowledge to the next generation of Micronesians.


In addition to Sunset on the Beach, Outrigger is lending its name to the Outrigger Hotels Waterman Challenge on Sunday, August 26. In this exciting competition, top lifeguard teams from Hawaii and California, as well as strong teams from the Outrigger Canoe Club and the Lanikai Canoe Club, will compete in this relay race that combines and showcases essential waterman skills of swimming, paddle boarding, and canoe paddling.

He was the first person to be inducted into both the Swimming Hall of Fame (1965) and the Surfing Hall of Fame (1966).

# Waikiki Beach Walk's Hawaiian Music Heritage Program presents John Cruz in Free Na Mele No Na Pua Concert

## Concert preceded by special showing of "Made of Music-The Story of John Cruz"



John Cruz takes the stage at Embassy Suites®-Waikiki Beach Walk® on August 25 as part of Outrigger Enterprises Group's free monthly Na Mele No Na Pua Hawaiian Music Heritage program.

Hosting the concert are TV and Radio personalities Brickwood Galuteria and Kimo Kahoano. A special showing of the documentary "Made of Music-The Story of John Cruz" will precede the concert, beginning at 3pm.

He returned to Hawaii in 1995, and just a year later, released his first album "Acoustic Soul," which sold over 100,000 copies in Hawaii alone. In October 2006, a documentary film on his life "Made of Music-The Story of John Cruz" debuted at the Louis Vuitton Hawaii International Film Festival in Hawaii.



"We need to treat our customers well to encourage more hotel guests, thereby increasing the need for employees."

Additional meetings are planned over the next several weeks to explain wage and benefit packages.

## Dorothy Feibleman to exhibit at *The Joy of Sake* Brilliant, translucent porcelain hallmark of renowned artist

Dorothy Feibleman, one of the world’s great porcelain artists, will preview select pieces of her work at the Joy of Sake in Honolulu on Aug. 23, 2007. Using clays she developed herself following years of study in Japan, she produces *sakazuki* (sake cups) of extraordinary grace and beauty. The translucency of the porcelain creates a play of light within the sake cup, greatly adding to the enjoyment of the sake-drinking experience.

Dorothy Feibleman’s work is in over twenty public and private collections, including the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Ceramics in Japan. “This is the first time I have shown my work at a sake event,” said Feibleman, speaking from her studio in London. “I chose The Joy of Sake in Honolulu since it is the only international festival closely related to my passion. I have not shown my sake cups between Tokyo and Chicago before this event.”

The Joy of Sake will be held on August 23, 2007 from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the Hawai’i Convention

Center at 1601 Kalakaua Avenue. More than 300 different junmai, ginjo and daiginjo sakes, including many not available in the U.S., will be available for tasting. 
